Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. John has a vision of what will be. The risen Lord Jesus provides visions of peace that passes human understanding and power beyond human imagination.

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The Pastor's message:

Do Not Fear"

Someone has counted that there are 365 times in the Bible where we are told, "do not fear"—one for every day of the year. In the Easter Gospels, fear is the most frequently mentioned resurrection response—six times in four stories. It's a natural response if the only two things that are certain in life are death and taxes (I am writing this on April 15th) and suddenly only taxes are certain, resurrection is something to fear. When we're suddenly caught off guard and don't know what to do, when we don't know what will happen to us or when reality is different than we thought it was, we experience fear. When the women went to the tomb to tend



to the body of the dear, dead friend, Jesus, and he wasn't there—fear was their natural response. For them it was far more than being scared and included disorientation, not knowing what's going to happen, the realization that there is far more going on here than they had any idea of, and that something more is the work of God.

There have been times in my life when I have been afraid: the second date with my husband John (I liked him so much on the first that I was afraid he was too good to be true); at the unexpected and sudden death of my mother; when John and I lost a child through a miscarriage; and some other times. But the time I was most afraid was about a week after I'd been ordained and realized the challenges that were facing the people and their very young pastor at St. Bartholomew's Lutheran Church in Trenton. By then I had a good look at the church finances and furnace. There were major issues with both. I called one of my internship supervisors, Pastor John Cochran, to confess that I didn't know if I could do this. I told him they didn't have enough money to cover my first paycheck (at \$1,167 a month) and that I had no idea if this would work. I will never forget his response, "Cindy, do the mission and the money will come." Well before "Field of Dreams," John's response moved me from fear to faith. Do not be afraid. Do the mission.

This is precisely what the women do on that Easter Sunday—they remember Jesus' words about being crucified and rising again, they go and tell the disciples, and even though their words are dismissed as an idle tale, they persist in believing. They do the mission.

In God's love through Jesus, we live, grow and share—that's our mission. As we continue on our Strategic Plan and begin to put it into action, there will be days when we have no idea if it will work, days when we will be tempted to fear change, days when we will want it to slow down or speed it up, days when we doubt and get upset and are full of worry and for each one of those days God gives us the command, "Do not be afraid" 365 times. Do the mission—live, grow and share in God's love through Jesus.


Explore, celebrate & grow in God's creation!

The St. John's youth are collecting aluminum beverage cans as a fund raiser to help with the costs of the 2019 mission trips. The aluminum beverage cans we collect can be taken to a local recycling center and we receive CASH for the aluminum based on weight. This is a very EASY way to earn money and we would really appreciate ALL your cans to help in this effort. Not only will bringing your aluminum beverage cans to St. John's help support the youth fundraising effort but recycling aluminum is wonderful for the environment.



Aluminum cans are unique in that they are most often recycled directly back into themselves meaning that the average can has a very high percentage of recycled content.

It takes just 8 percent of the energy to produce aluminum from recycled material versus producing new aluminum so high recycled content is a good indicator of the can's environmental footprint.

- The average aluminum can is made from 68 percent total recycled content, the highest of any beverage container.
- Cans go from the recycling bin to store shelves within 60 days.
- The aluminum can is the only package that more than covers its recycling costs, helping to finance the collection and recycling of other materials such as glass and plastic.

PLEASE help us and bring us your cans. All aluminum cans are welcome. There is a special aluminum recycle bin in Kley Hall for can collection. Please bag your cans and drop them in this bin. Thank You!!

The meeting with all attendees listed above was called to order at 7:30 pm with a prayer offered by Pastor Krommes.

 - Dr. Brown will contact each team (not committee).
 - Teams will work with existing committees.
 - New team recruits will not be obligated to a long-term commitment to the area of focus.
- Implementation plan and timeline
- Communication plan to the whole congregation

During the process/change, it is essential to make the WHY clear to the congregation; this will strengthen and grow our congregation.

- Go Slow Introduce change elements at a rate the congregation can absorb.
- Be Transparent Over-communicate to the congregation that changes will be happening in the 5 areas of priority and what changes the congregation can expect and the timing.
 - Dedicated bulletin board in the hallway nearest the sanctuary
 - Bulletin inserts, Newsletters, e-mail blasts
 - Act as a Community No small caucuses; no exclusions
 - Monthly or twice a month updates from the 5 areas. Sonya will coordinate input from the teams and disseminate.
 - What do we communicate, when do we communicate?
 - Communication should let congregation know who leaders are in the areas. March 23 ideas are going to the teams.
 - Mitch will boil down communication. Mitch to write up something for initial communication and Elise will review.
 - Next step Council will consider Sunday morning schedule and Christian Education model/schedule. Christian Education and Worship and Music to work together to bring a recommendations for Council and review at the June 10 Council Meeting.
 - Electronic screen for announcements in the narthex. This is approved for implementation.
 - Communicate on Easter have names of team leaders and contact information, distribute on Palm Sunday
 - Be Calm Stay the course; remain non-reactive to people's fear or unrest about changes. Be caring and thoughtful in dealing with congregation.
 - Expect Push-Back If everyone agrees, people are not alert to what is happening.
 - Be Fair Everyone needs to be heard.
 - Assume positive intent Everyone's point comes from a good place. They have best possible intention in what they are trying to do.
 - Be positive with a hopeful message about strengthening and growing St. John's for the future.

- Try new things Think outside the box, get out of our comfort zone. Move beyond same, same, same.
 - Ability to go back After thoughtful consideration give new things adequate time for adoption. If it's not working, don't be afraid to abandon it and try something different.
- Emphasize the things that are working well at St. John's and will continue and the things that need work.

Build Out Teams

- Dr. Brown with work with the teams to build the teams.
 - How do members find their way into these 5 areas of focus?
 - Be inclusive and transparent
 - People need to be asked
 - At least two new voices should be included in each Team.

Implementation Plan and Timeline

- The 3/23 Meeting resulted in good ideas to feed into the 5 area. Teams will take these ideas and create concrete action steps
 - Create a time line or continuum; what ideas can be implemented immediately, what is the sequence. Consider the low and high impact to the congregation of each action.
 - Congregation is ready no more meetings, they want to see action now
 - Take the post-it notes down and divide them into the 5 areas and give them to teams. Leads need to look at what's on the post its. Bobbi will divide the post-it notes.
- How do Teams and Committees Work together?
 - Teams are not coming into committees; they will work together for a couple of months.
 - Not folding into committees forever; Team Leads have not yet had their meetings.
 - Keep standing committees involved with teams
 - Use committee meeting time with people who have expressed interest in the teams.
- Implementation
 - Final Decision Council Committees need to bring forward to Council the WHY and what problem they are trying to fix, and how this change will directly address this problem. Look at the root of the issues.
 - What needs to come to Council for a decision?
 - Budget Impact, Staff, Hiring
 - Large scale purchases
 - Major changes such as worship time, services impact.
 - Executive Committee vets these first and determines what needs to come to the full Council if there are questions.
 - What does not need Council approval
 - New welcoming plan/ambassadors
 - Christian Education curriculum (rotational model)
 - Things to increase physical or virtual visibility
 - Some ideas can be implemented immediately, others will take more time.
 - If teams or committees are unsure if they have authority to implement it, send questions to the Executive Committee, Mitch Reading or Dick Kunsch (Council President or Vice President)
 - Who does the timeline Steven Drewes is familiar with the process and he and Shelley agreed to help build out a communication plan that would go along with the timeline.
 - Committees work together on things that have an impact on other groups, i.e., Worship and Music and Christian Education regarding worship and Sunday school schedule/timing.
