From the Pastor:

The Trade Entering the Body

There have been blessings in this time of quarantine: walks, "happy hours" with my husband, quiet without the underlying buzz of traffic on Route 422, and abundance of birds building nests and singing in our back yard, and the chance to do more reading. Here's a quote from *The Abundance* by Annie Dillard in a chapter entitled "A Writer in the World" which caught my attention:

"The body of literature, with its limits and edges, exists outside some people and inside others. Only after the writer lets literature shape her can she perhaps shape literature. In working-class France, when an apprentice got hurt, or when he got tired, the experienced workers said, "It is the trade entering his body." The art must enter the body too. A painter cannot use



paint like glue or screws to fasten down the world. The tubes of paint are like fingers; they work only if, inside the painter, the neural pathways are wide and clear to the brain. Cell by cell, molecule by molecule, atom by atom, part of the brain changes physical shape to fit the paint."

I shared this with some of the artists in my life, but also want to share it with you, the beloved people of St. John's, for more and more I believe that a congregation is a communal work of art. Think about it—musicians, teachers, parents, children, saints, painters, repairers, poets, artists, gardeners, human beings—all made of humus (dirt)—of earth and spirit, together are shaped by God into the body of Christ at 355 St. John's Circle, but also in our homes, our neighborhoods, our town, our county, our state, country, world. Through worship and learning and laughter, through tears and sorrow and grief, through forgiveness and love and abundance, through prayer and God's Word and sacraments, "the trade" enters our body and part of our brains change physical shape by such surprising grace.

It's stunningly beautiful. Just this past weekend, it was a bride and groom who dreamed of a wedding surrounded by an abundance of family and friends, bravely marrying one another on a spring Saturday in the Jane Kunsch Memorial Garden before a small "socially distant" gathering. It was a team coming together to weed and mulch the garden, again maintaining social distance. It was our ninth graders meeting outside in the Circle as they prepare for Confirmation and neighborhood children practicing their bike riding, progressing from training wheels to two wheels as they peddle around and around in the parking lot. And at the same time, it was our congregation worshiping while at home listening to Bach being played by the Providence String Quartet, singing the hymns, hearing God's word, being the Church. It's all of this and by God's grace alone, beautifully more.

St. John's wants to make sure everyone stays safe and healthy, especially amid COVID-19. Here are the immediate measures we have taken in response to the pandemic:

• All worship services are online; materials for at-home worship are being mailed to parishioners without computer access.

• Meetings and Christian education classes are conducted via teleconference and children's materials are available for downloading at home.

- Our sexton has followed the initial CDC guidelines for sanitation of the building; before we gather again, we will follow the updated CDC guidelines to re-sanitize.
- Staff and volunteers are working remotely as much as possible and staggering work hours in the building to limit in-person contact.
- High-touch surfaces such as light switches and door handles are wiped down at least twice a week.
- Staff, volunteers, and parishioners who <u>must</u> enter the building are asked to disinfect any surfaces with which they have come in contact before leaving; cleaning supplies and hand sanitizer are available throughout the building.
- Members of the Property Committee are checking the building regularly so that any problems do not go unnoticed in the absence of staff on the premises.
- Non-essential visitors are discouraged, and everyone is asked to wear a mask during in-person contact.

We are carefully reviewing the recommendations from the governor, the CDC and the ELCA to determine how and when we can safely return to in-person worship. A re-entry team has been formed to focus on this task. In all decisions, we will be guided by concern for the health of St. John's parishioners and our community. Please continue to pray for one another, for those working to find vaccines and treatments, and for all affected by COVID-19.

Dear Church:

Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

During the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, I am encouraged by your resilience and creativity in our witness to the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. I am also inspired by your generosity. Through the ELCA COVID-19 Response Fund and our Daily Bread grants, we are providing critical support to struggling yet vital ministries across this church. Through Lutheran Disaster Response International we have intensified our accompaniment of global partners. *We are church together.*

This is a trying time for us all. At the same time, we know that a disproportionate burden of illness, death, discrimination and harassment falls on communities of color. This pandemic has exacerbated racism and racial inequities deep-



ly entrenched in society and across the church. We see this in the growing anti-Asian racism and the disproportionate number of deaths in black, American Indian and Latinx communities. I have been learning from the leaders of the ELCA's ethnic associations how the data we see on the news is experienced in real life. I have listened to leaders of color share the impact of this pandemic on their communities, on their lives and on their ministries. These stories are difficult but important, so we are launching a special series on LivingLutheran.org to lift up these voices for us all to hear. We also seek to ensure that our COVID-19 response more effectively tends to the realities of racism and racial inequality. *We are church together.*

Recently, in cities across this country, we have seen horrifying anti-Semitic and white supremacist messages displayed during public protests against government orders that are intended to protect lives. No matter our politics or opinions about our elected leaders and their policies, all of us must come together on the basis of our church's commitments to condemn racism against indigenous people and people of color, white supremacy, sexism, and anti-Semitism whenever they occur. Whether our churches and communities are racially diverse or predominantly white, our work for racial and economic justice for all people is work for all of us. *We are church together*.

Just as God has joined us to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ in baptism, we are joined to each other. Paul helps us to understand this by speaking of the one body of Christ, with many members. While this is always true, perhaps we feel it more acutely in this time of physical distancing. In our longing to be church together, let us be even more intentional in sharing with each other, easing each other's burdens, consoling each other in our fear and grief, condemning what is contrary to the gospel and living out our baptismal covenant "to strive for justice and peace in all the earth."

Staff Reports

- T. Snyder's Report Tom's involvement in the video services has been a rewarding and growing experience. Tom is also trying to stay in touch with the choir members.
- J. Quinn's Report No Report. John has done a fine job recording music for the video services.
- J. Wentworth's Report With PA schools now closed through this academic year, St. John's Sunday School will likewise not resume. Jen will continue her on-line lessons and communications with the SS age families. A decision about holding VBS still TBD.
- Pastor's Report Pleased with the numbers of views of the video services. Pastor has shared the service links through her own FB page and encourages others to also share. St. John's is in a position to assist any local, needy families. Please contact Pastor if you know someone in need.
- Sonya Sowards The outside groups are no longer meeting at the church. Entering the building should be limited to critical needs only. We now have CDC guidelines on what to do to make our building safe from a direct COVID 19 exposure or how to prepare as we look to the future when we 're-open.' Mark Yanchek has been following all appropriate guidelines.

Finance Committee and Income & Expense Report – No Finance meeting.

- Pastor reported that March giving, while down, was better than expected.
- Don Titus reported that he had talked to Jack Ertell and Shirley Platzer and the finance report presented was accurate to date.

Motion by Dale Herbranson, Second by Don Titus to accept the Staff and Finance Committee and Income & Expense Reports; Motion passed.

Council reviewed the following Committee Reports:

- Stewardship Committee virtual meeting: the Stewardship letter was mailed to all. Good response so far.
- Electronics Committee No Meeting, but Dale Herbranson and Bill Schoellkopf have put in long hours supporting the video services.

- Christian Education and Youth and Family Committee Zoom Meeting April 8, 2020
 Our ASP trip has been officially cancelled. The finances are still being worked out. Pastor suggested that any money already given to ASP via Social Ministry be donated to ASP. Jen plans to order VBS materials. If we cancel VBS this year we will use those materials next year.
- Property Committee Zoom Meeting April 6, 2020
 Property supports the state and federal stay-at-home guidelines and will not put out any "asks" for the usual spring tasks. Mulching will be delayed until further notice. The building will be monitored on a weekly or as needed basis. "See Something – Say Something"
- Worship and Music Committee Zoom Meeting March 31, 2020
 Video services will continue as long as necessary. When a normal service can be held, we will treat it as an "Easter Celebration."
- Welcome Team Committee No Meeting but they have the list of the names of new people from the last three 'Way Classes' and will stay in touch with all new members to keep them connected to St. John's.
- Social Ministry Committee from April 1, 2020 virtual meeting. Easter meals paid for and delivered to St. John's shut ins. Easter meals also delivered to Phoenixville Meals on Wheels recipients.

Motion by Sandra Zimmermann , Second by Donna Searchfield to accept committee reports; Motion passed.

Old Business

- After a discussion with the executive committee, Pastor Krommes has agreed to delay her retirement until the middle of August, providing the world has returned to normal by that time.
 - Mitch and Pastor will contact the Synod to see what needs to be done to change her retirement date.
 - Sonya will send out a membership wide mailing with this announcement at an appropriate date TBD. Sonya says a full membership mailing takes 4 hours of her time and about \$200.00 in expenses.
 - Motion by Don Titus, with a second by Dick Kunsch to accept this revised retirement plan and move Pastor Krommes' retirement party from May 17, 2020 to August 16, 2020. Motion passed.
 - We would plan to have the Interim Pastor start the middle of August to allow time for a learning curve prior to the new program year.

New Business

- Mitch Reading offered a well-deserved and heartfelt THANK YOU to the Staff for their extraordinary work during this crisis and to the Worship Leaders, Dale Herbranson and Bill Schoelkopf for their outstanding efforts to create our video services.


