Dear Friends in Christ,

One of my favorite pieces of choral music is a short anthem called "E'en so, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come," written by a composer by the name of Paul Manz. (There are dozens of great recordings of it on YouTube. I'd encourage you to listen to it; it's only a couple of minutes long). It's a beautiful piece of music, and both the text (drawn from the book of Revelation) and the story behind it are powerful.

Manz was a Lutheran church musician, organist, and composer for most of his life. In 1953, when their three-year-old son was gravely ill, he and his wife Ruth composed "E'en So, Lord Jesus..." while they were staying with him, praying for him and caring for him. In an interview a few years ago, they said,

- If think we'd reached the point where we felt that time was certainly running out so we committed it to the Lord and said, 'Lord Jesus quickly come,'" Ruth says.
- ⋄ "I made a sketch that night at the bedside and miraculously through prayer by a lot of people John survived," Paul says.

The music helps to convey the worry and grief and pain that the Manzes felt, but also their trust in God, knowing that Jesus would return and that everything—including their worry and grief—were in God's hands.

That sense of hope in Jesus' return, that no matter how scary or fearful the world might be, God will one day make it right, and that we can trust in God to keep those promises even in the face of fear and death and suffering, is written throughout Revelation, and really throughout the Scriptures. It's one of the major themes of Advent: as we prepare to celebrate Jesus coming to us two millennia ago, we also get to look ahead to his coming in glory; that fearful hope is one of the things that I love most about Advent. Even in the face of all the fears and worries that we face—and they're many—we can still pray, "Come quickly, Lord Jesus."

Of course, the hope in Jesus' return and the trust in God that we proclaim doesn't mean that we can do whatever we want in the meantime. We're still called to use the gifts that God has given us to love God and to love our neighbors, to protect vulnerable and marginalized people, and to care for creation. We're called to share God's love with the world, even in the face of the fear and uncertainty and pain that the world throws at everyone. But we also know that fear and sin and pain are fighting a losing battle, because we know that Jesus will return, that God will dwell with us, that every tear will be wiped away

Even so, Lord, quickly come.


Faith Formation for Adults

Buy less

Thrivent Action Team Grants

Thrivent members are eligible to apply for two Action Team Grants each year to benefit their church. St. John's members Mike & Cathy Kahl routinely obtain grants for the church and have provided a helpful step-by-step guide:

First, you must have a specific project in mind. You will also have to give an estimate of the number of people that might participate and when the project will be completed. The project should have something to do with bringing people into our organization or furthering our ministries.

Once you have the above information, log in to your account at thrivent.com.

Go to the bottom of the page to the Noah section. Click on Thrivent action teams.

Choose "apply now" on the first page and then "apply now" again.

On the next page, click "begin application." You have an option to get advertising materials and even T-shirts for your action team if you want them.

The money arrives fairly quickly in the form of a Visa card. Use this card for purchases related to your project.

When the project is finished, log in again and report that fact.

Special projects pop up from time to time at St. John's for which these cards could be used.
