

Dear Friends: At our 2025 Annual Meeting, the congregation generously approved the Property Committee's request to proceed with necessary repairs to the roof, replace the concrete bridge into Kley Hall from the back parking lot, repave the sidewalks, install a handicapped access ramp at the Kley Hall entrance and other small projects.

The Square Foot Facts

Since the leaking roof over Kley Hall, administration and the classrooms is the most pressing issue, we would like to start those repairs as soon as possible. This is an overdue replacement of the flat and pitched roofs. We have stretched its lifespan well beyond its normal life, and leaks are routinely being found. We have a contractor lined up and a contract signed and ready to go. We just need your help in raising the \$102,400 that is required to keep us warm and dry.



Join "The 320 Club"



- 1. Finance Task Force:
 - o Task Force of Mitch Reading, Kevin Gallagher, Sue Starling, Janet Gerner and Jeanne Schanzenbach met several times to review the current funds.
 - Reviewed dedicated funds to see if they could be simplified, should continue to be carried forward in perpetuity, etc.
 - The only fund that is legally required to remain in perpetuity is the Circle of Life Endowment fund, of which only the earnings on the principal can be spent (unless a special congregational vote allows otherwise.)

Generosity in Giving Testimonial


